is released twice per semester and has been published since 1999. WOTS Magazine is written, laid out, and printed by young adult Christians who love Jesus and want to write about God, life, and college.





If you want to go out, grab a \$2 breakfast with your student ID on a Saturday at the Blind Munchies Coffeehouse. You can get a nice breakfast at a cheap price. Quick grab-and-go sandwiches are often available at the Blind Munchies starting at \$3, along with delicious, fresh bakery. If you need to shop for groceries, consider going to Aldi, which has a great selection at low prices.

EAGER FOR ENTERTAINMENT

Did you know that Menomonie has guite a bit to do around town that doesn't cost an arm and a leg? There are free events during the year at the Blind Munchies Coffeehouse and Raw Deal on Friday evenings, and there are often concerts during the semesters in the Fireside Cafe at Stout through Blue Devil Productions on Thursday evenings.

Want to go to a movie? If you go to the Menomonie 7 Theatre uptown (across from the road leading to Walmart) on a Tuesday, movies are only \$5. During the fall and spring semesters, the Applied Arts also feature various movies for free.



SAVING WHILE SHOPPING

If you're in need of new clothes, consider thrifting. In Menomonie, you can shop at Goodwill, Cherry Pickers, or the new Hope Gospel Bargain Center on North Broadway. If you find yourself in Eau Claire, you can go to Plato's Closet. Both Cherry Pickers and Plato's allow you to sell clothing that is not too outdated or overused, so if you have some current in-style clothing that you're not wearing anymore, consider selling it to make some money!

Living on a college budget doesn't have to be a fight for survival; it can be an opportunity to learn how to thrive on what you have in your wallet. Thankfully, we live in a town where there is plenty to do at a not-so-high price.

WHAT THE PROFESSORS SAY: Q & A!

Q: What is the best way to get to know a professor?

A: "Introduce yourself, but don't stop there. Parents often tell their children to introduce themselves, but when you have multiple students in multiple sections coming up and introducing themselves, faces and names can become lost if there is no follow up. Follow up is key, especially in large lecture classes. If the professor asks questions [in class], try to answer, even if you're wrong. Doing so shows you're engaged, and teachers remember."

Q: How can students get to know their professors on a more personal level?

A: "In a classroom format, especially a lecture class, it's not that easy to get to know them [professors] personally. There is automatically a certain formal distance in the relationship. Some professors like to share more about themselves with students than others do. If the professor is mentoring a student org, or offering any outside of class activities, where there is less of a formal interaction, and that is the best chance to get to know them as people."

Q: Why should I care about getting to know my professors?

A: "Communicating [with professors] is good practice for general human interaction. You'll be interacting with other people in the future, including a boss. Some students don't have initiative or practice in communicating, and so taking the time to interact with your professors will help you get over potential social awkwardness that may come with talking with such figures."

God bless you and fill you with hope for His ministry at U.W. Stout.








QUARTERLY MUSIC BEAT


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SEK HAO

ackie Hill Perry describes her dramatic journey in her new book, Gay Girl, Good God. She felt burdened to share her story with three different audiences. First, her book is for those who are churchgoing heterosexuals seeking to understand what same-sex attracted individuals go through. Also, her book is for churchgoing, same-sex attracted people so they know they are not alone. Finally, this book is for people who do not believe in God at all. Perry's memoir addresses the sinfulness of the human heart, and she wants everyone to ask themselves, believer or not, if they know the reason they were made and whether or not they are living in light of that.

At the age of four or five, Jackie Hill Perry remembers being same-sex attracted. But, she felt confused and didn't know what to do with it. She suppressed her desire growing up, but when she reached her

teenage years, she decided to begin having relationships with other women. At the same time, she started smoking marijuana and watching pornography.

After high school, Perry's life took a dramatic turn towards God. She had very little church experience as a kid, but it was enough to teach her that God was real. At 19, God confronted her on her lifestyle and her rebellion. She quickly realized she was not in good standing with God and that she desperately wanted to be.

Throughout the book, Perry takes a very honest approach to her relationship with God. After becoming a Christian, her desires for women didn't disappear instantly. It is a battle she fights because she loves God more than she loves herself and when there is conflict, she lets Him win. Perry's book is a good lesson for all of us because we all struggle with sin. We are often guilty of lying, trying to be perfect, gossiping, getting drunk, and countless other sins. Anything we desire more than God will only lead to dissatisfaction. Perry points to Jesus as our Savior and our Helper in fighting these battles.

STARTER KIT

7 KEYS TO STEP UP YOUR HUMAN INTERACTION GAME

Once you realize that you haven't had a face-to-face conversation with someone you don't know in some time, thoroughly analyze why this is the case. "Do I look funny? Do I stare a hole into someone's soul when I try to engage them? Is it the stale mustard on my shirt, the unshaven oil-free beard, or the way I stare at the ground when someone approaches me? What could it be?"

Relax and consider the fact that everyone has butterflies and a sour stomach about engaging in meaningful deep conversation with someone they have never met or someone they're intimidated by. Well, mostly everyone, will make you skinny or a half-eaten burrito.

Choose your prey. Just kidding, that's the exact wrong way to go about it. There's a reason once you leave town there are a number of driveways with signs that say Beware of Dog, No Solicitors, We know who we are voting for, We don't need a vacuum, or We don't buy insurance. No. Turn around. Conversation is best done in a public setting.

Position yourself to have a face-to-face conversation. Look up, look around, and live. Don't stare at your feet or phone and get smoked by a bus. No one ever enjoyed eating pavement. Find one or two people and identify the correct timing to step over. Don't walk at a snail's pace; walk up confidently, but expect to feel weird. Weird is okay. By this point, it's essential that you realize the "success" of the conversation is not just based on how it goes, but instead, count gains in strides. Do not buy them lavish gifts and try to flatter them. You cannot buy good conversation.

Think of a good ice breaker, not too deep but not too common, and don't play dumb. Be clever but not too punny. There's a healthy balance here. Also, do not google "ice breakers." You may end up asking someone, "If you were stranded on a desert island, who would you take with you?" Depending on the situation, they may think you are trying to kidnap them. Stay away from sending threatening vibes. Try, "Mind if I join you?" Right then and there you will likely have a starting point for a follow-up comment. It may go well, mediocre, or terrible, but you will walk away knowing you tried and will be ready to move on to try that again with someone else (preferably someone who was not waiting in line at the gas station; that was awkward).

After the ice breaking fest, move on to deeper questions like, "Where are you from?" or "Out of all the places in the world to be what brings you here?" Make compliments like, "I like your shoes and/or hair," or whatever's not really crazy to talk about. It's not a date, but it could be a lasting friendship.

Once you're in a real life conversation, give and take.

Don't talk the whole time and understand silence is okay sometimes (unless the person stopped breathing, then call 911). Realize conversation is not a step-by-step program. Be okay with screwing up and don't yell if they make you angry.

Today, archaeologists piece together history based on what is left behind, which might only be just a few terracotta shards and a tooth. Cold case detectives try to solve decades-old mysteries by linking together fragments of information and attempting to locate witnesses who might still be alive. Historians debate the accuracy of accounts by comparing physical records in an attempt to find out what actually took place. The goal with all of these professions is to find the truth, but in all these situations there are missing links and major gaps in knowledge to overcome. There is always going to be guesswork involved because the passing of time inevitably leaves behind only hazy, fuzzy remnants, if anything remains behind at all. It seems that, one way or another, time refines what is truly enduring.

Some time ago, I worked at a second-hand store. It always broke my heart when we got in a donation of what was clearly on behalf of someone who had died. There were photos, journals, award ribbons, and a thousand other sentimental objects all mashed together in boxes, and it was my job to either trash it, recycle it, or put a few of these "treasures" out on the sales floor to be sold for merely a couple of dollars. Such was the culmination of their lives.

Certainly, most of us want to make an impact on the world we live in because we want our lives to matter. We want to be successful and live our lives well. A few months ago I was able to hear Stanford Graduate School of Business Professor Jennifer Aaker speak. In her presentation, she said it well: "People want to be valued members of a winning team on an inspired mission." Sounds accurate! Yet it sounds near impossible at times, too. For the problem lies in the fact that we're just not "big picture people," and by "big," I mean "forever minded." We may be goal-oriented and have a five-year plan in place, and have daydreams about growing old with someone, but forever? The reality is, humanity generally pursues things that don't last beyond our lifetimes, or, at best, even the lifetimes of those who knew us.

It is imperative to understand that indeed you do matter, but not in the way you think. For the amount of possessions and achievements you accumulate on this earth fail to ultimately impact because they are all so very temporary. The number of diplomas, awards and accolades you gather will be forgotten, and even if you do manage to achieve fame and fortune, you at best just eventually become a Wikipedia entry. That job you do so well at and gain promotion after promotion will certainly give you money and comfort for a while, but the moment you're gone they will simply find someone else to fill your desk. Your name will come off the door and be replaced by "Bob-from-sales" next door. We live our lives this way because we are driven by an intense "fear of missing out," or at least not being included, which is why we fill our lives with the trappings of "success," (i.e. diplomas, money, social reputation, et cetera), blindly forgetting that none of it will last. It may be hard to hear, but the truth is, time will erase you. The problem is always the "end game."

Think about it. When you reflect on your past, what sticks out to you? I remember faces and places. I remember experiences I had. What I don't remember, or simply don't care about any longer, is how well I did on that test, how high a wage I received at that job, or the level of

applause I had at my piano recital. Then if you ask me what I remember about a friend or a relative, the amount of memory dwindles exponentially. I remember the time we went to the amusement park together and shared a treat, but that's about it. Is a "successful life" the accumulation of tangible indicators like money, awards, athletic prowess and social reputation, or is there something more? What should be our goal? Is the answer to be remembered by as many people as possible as having done something noteworthy?

No doubt you have heard of this guy Jesus. You know, from the Bible? How is it that this homeless man from Nazareth, who died over 2,000 years ago with only a scattered, poor, and rag tag band of followers, is not only seriously remembered today but He literally changed the course of history and is even yet today revered and worshipped? How did that happen? What did He do that was so remarkable? How was He so successful? How did He so "move the world?" So much memory and knowledge is lost to the vastness of time, yet not this man Jesus.

Stanford professor Chip Heath recorded that people tend to recall stories after listening to a speech 63% of the time versus hearing statistics, which were remembered only 5% of the time. It seems that stories make a bigger impact than mere accolades and data. We are definitely "story people," and there is a reason for that. The fact is, we live in a giant "world purpose narrative," and we are either on one side of the story with Jesus, or the other without Him, but we're never excluded from it. So often we fail to realize that Jesus is our "missing piece"...the "one whom we are looking for." It's not "what" we are missing, but who we are missing! We seek to imitate the value, the purpose and the drive that Christ offers with a hope in and for a life of worldly success. But it all ultimately rings hollow and we are left "holding the bag."

The struggle that so many of us have who do believe, is that we tend to think that joining Jesus will produce a version of success that will look a lot like the world's version of success, or at least our own understanding of it. But as a follower of Christ, it's His story we're in now, not our own! However, we must also resist the temptation to swing wildly to the other side and embrace a thinking that says that by being a believer in Christ my life will therefore look *nothing* like what I planned. That my dreams and goals are therein erased! Such is rarely the case yet it will certainly look different. Specifically, it won't be recorded in statistics (the number of gold stars I earned or the stuff I own), but rather it will be marked by the number of stories and even "micro stories" I was a part of and how they played out in the paradigm of God's will. One of my favorite stories in the Bible is the story of a woman whom Jesus inexplicably praised while others declared her action a waste:

"HOW FOOLISH WE CAN BE IN OUR ATTEMPT TO CLING WHITE-KNUCKLED TO THAT WHICH DOES NOT ENDURE."

"And when Jesus was in Bethany at the house of Simon the leper, a woman came to Him having an alabaster flask of very costly fragrant oil, and she poured it on His head as He sat at the table. But when His disciples saw it, they were indignant, saying, 'Why this waste? For this fragrant oil might have been sold for much and given to the poor.' But when Jesus was aware of it, He said to them, 'Why do you trouble the woman? For she has done a good work for Me. For you have the poor with you always, but Me you do not have always. For in pouring this fragrant oil on My body, she did it for My burial. Assuredly, I say to you, wherever this gospel is preached in the whole world, what this woman has done will also be told as a memorial to her." (Matthew 26:6-13, NKJV)

This woman, merely a footnote in secular history, possessed something that the world held as valuable. She could have used its worth for her own benefit, or like the disciples suggested, sold it and given the profits to a social cause. Either way she would be a worldly "winner." For personal wealth, pleasure, and contributing towards charity, are indicators of success in our social culture and values. However, according to Jesus' definition of success, giving up something of such value to invest in Him was what actually made her profoundly "successful." For true success is the sheer blissful union of your life with the life and narrative of the One who set this whole earth in motion and set you and I on it. That woman wasn't thinking about the loss of the perfume, or the men in the room shaking their heads in disgust at her. She was thinking of Jesus and how much He meant to her. She wanted to show Him her love and she did it in a big way. So big it seems that we're still talking about her and this act even yet today.

In this age we live in the shadow of Jesus' life. We don't know every detail of His walk through this world, yet we do have many of His recorded words and in such something intensely profound:

"If you love Me, keep My commandments," Jesus said, 'I will pray the Father, and He will give you another Helper, that He may abide with you forever – the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees Him nor knows Him; but you know Him, for He dwells with you and will be in you."" (John 14:15-17, NKJV)

Jesus does not expect you to somehow find this spiritual road of success on your own or achieve a sudden and profound 180-degree directional life change independently. For He gives to us of Himself in the form of the Holy Spirit to help us walk the walk He is leading us towards. Rejecting the world's version of success for His version is not something that we suddenly and inexplicably wake up and decide to do one day. Rather it is His prompting in you and your daily desire to actually follow Him. And the fact is, that honestly takes a lifetime to unfold. Or just maybe, in order to see that unfold, *He gives you a lifetime...*

The missionary legend Jim Elliot lost his life on the mission field in Ecuador in 1956 at the age of 28. He left behind a journal entry that profoundly and prophetically recorded these words: "He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep to gain that which he cannot lose." After his "untimely" death, his wife, Elizabeth Elliot, went to the very same people in Ecuador who had murdered her husband to bring to them the truth and love of Jesus. Many of them eventually believed and repented and turned their lives to God, forsaking the traditions that had led them through a personal and corporate history of endless sin. Jim Elliot died, but not as a forgotten failure. For according to Jesus, he had achieved true and profound success in life because although he lost his physical life, he had gained all by giving all - his life and even his death - thereby gaining real and meaningful life with Jesus. And ironically, to top it all off, his legacy lives on to this very day!

Jesus once said that "...unless a grain of wheat falls into the ground and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it produces much grain" (John 12:24, NKJV). After all, what is the purpose of a plant growing a seed? It is of course to produce new life after the original plant is dead and gone. Jesus' definition of success does not naturally look like success to us because it involves death. We therefore reject His plan in lieu of our own because death is something we are naturally compelled to avoid at all costs. If our goal and purpose in this life is to have a nice family, career and house - if that is our definition of success - what happens then when those things are gone? Further, what happens then when we die, and WE are gone? How foolish we can be in our attempts to cling white-knuckled to that which does not endure. To try to hold on to, as Jim Elliot said, "that which we cannot keep." Jesus is a Master storyteller, and the Master story-writer. He's got a part for you to play. In embracing that role we come to know and understand what real success is. A legacy and inheritance "that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading...[one that is] kept in heaven for you..." (1 Peter 1:4) A "success" that lasts forever.

remember trying to read the Bible on my own a couple times as a kid. Growing up in church, reading "the good book" just seemed like it was something we were supposed to do. I usually started in Genesis and by chapter four (when the first baby ever born grows up to kill his own brother) I decided this book was just too weird to be spending any more time in. If you've ever tried to read the Bible and you're not quite sure what to think about it, this article is for you. I wanted to just touch on what we can know for sure about the Bible, which happens to be the most read book in the entire world.¹


The Bible claims to be divinely inspired. 2 Timothy 3:16 tells us, "All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work." This means that the Bible is claiming to be a book written by humans who were inspired by God Himself. The Bible holds God's thoughts, His commands, and His desires for the lives of the people He created: us. If you're a person desiring to know God, I would encourage you to read His word and discover for yourself how it has the power to speak to you personally (Hebrews 4:12). Alternatively, if you're a person who believes the Bible is an archaic text with little connection to or involvement in our lives in 2018, I

challenge you to read on. While no words written here can convince a human heart to believe in the God of the Bible, I hope the words below at least pique your interest and motivate you to do more digging.

We can trust the Bible by the impressive unity of its historical records, archaeological finds, and accurate accounts of prophecy.

When I was doing my research, I learned that the Bible was written by around 40 different authors in three languages, and on three continents, all spanning a period of approximately 2,000 years.²

Despite all of this, its message remains the same: the people God created rebelled against their Maker, yet God extends His grace towards them in the person of Jesus. The Bible contains numerous accounts of fulfilled prophecy, such as Isaiah's prediction of Cyrus becoming the king of Persia roughly 200 years before his birth. Or how about the prophet Micah foretelling Christ's birth in the town of Bethlehem, which is quite the distance from Nazareth where Jesus's parents lived (two hours by car, if you're wondering).³ Because the Bible includes accurate prophesies like this, it points to there being a God outside of time who gave the writers insight into future events. All this despite the fact that the many locations and differences in personality of the authors didn't change the meaning of the corporate text in its entirety. These accounts give proof that the Bible is reliable.

We can trust the Bible because it has not changed substantially over time, as many people think it has.

Have you studied how well-preserved the Bible is compared to other ancient literature? In 1890, Andrew Archibald Macdonald, a merchant and politician from Prince Edward Island, was quoted saying the following: "None of the original manuscripts of the Bible have been preserved. Shall we therefore reject this book? As well might we throw away the works of Homer, who flourished from eight to nine hundred years before Christ, but of whose writings we have no complete copy older than the thirteenth century, and no fragments even older than the sixth century—fifteen centuries after the blind poet died."4 In 1947, when the Dead Sea Scrolls were found, we learned just how similar the Bible we can read today matches the text from Jesus' time and even before then.⁵

We can trust the Bible because of the way it

describes the human condition.

The Bible isn't afraid to admit the good, the bad, and the ugly. The Bible includes account after account of humans turning away from God or lacking in their obedience to Him. It tells story after story of men and women who didn't keep the promises they made to God. In the Bible, Peter is described as one of Jesus's closest friends, yet three times he denied he knew and followed Jesus. ⁶ Jeremiah 17:9 says, "the human heart is the most deceitful of all things, and desperately wicked. Who really knows how bad it is?" We see that's true in our tendency as humans to be jealous, easily irritated, to lie, to slander, to fight, to murder... If the Bible were written by a human writer seeking to impersonate God, why would they talk about human faults to the extent the Bible does? Wouldn't they want to focus on all the good things humans do?

My own relationship with God became real when I began noticing I wasn't the good person I thought I was. I slowly became willing to look in the mirror and I saw more faults than I knew what to do with. God promises us in Jeremiah 29:13, "You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart." I started reading the Bible and found it incredible in how deeply it spoke to my inner life. If your heart desires to know who God is in even one small way, open a Bible and have faith that God will show up. For Christians, it's a joy to study the Bible and be in the presence of God, but this doesn't usually happen overnight. Just like building a friendship, the more time you spend in the word of God, the more you will understand, and I dare say the more you will love, His true character.



With winter here and the humdrum of life taking its toll, the allure of a quiet night on the couch with Netflix at the ready feels like the best decision you've made all day. Stress just melts away when you turn on your favorite show and sink into the couch. But I bet you know the flip side too, right? 
in life itself. Can you relate to my story? The UW-Stout Blue Devils play their home hockey games there and they've been known to draw over a thousand students to cheer them on! The local Menomonie High School team, the Mustangs, also play their home hockey games there. Elsewhere on the premises, there's a huge hill perfect for



sledding. Just pick up a sled and warm clothes and let the fun times begin. After winter has been around awhile at the Rec Park, you'll find an outdoor ice rink perfect for skating outside or playing broomball. For broomball, you'll want an old-style stiff broom, a ball, and plenty of friends to play with.

Are you feeling adventurous and up for a little road trip? Then the Badlands Sno-Park will not disappoint you. Get your friends together and go check it out in Hudson, about a 50-minute ride west of Menomonie. Don't let the price of \$17 for an all-day ticket scare you away. It's well worth the money once you get there. The Badlands Sno-Park will give you the thrill of a lifetime in the snow tubing world. They have small hills so you can learn what you're doing and mentally prepare yourself for the adrenaline rush of flying down a hill on a tube when it's 10 degrees out. You'll also find hills that will make your face look like a dog hanging their head out the window on a hot summer day. Don't worry about having to walk back up the hill because there is a convenient tow rope that you can grab hold of to tow you right back up the hill. With that in mind, it's very important to have a good pair of gloves so you don't irritate your hands too much on the tow rope.

If you're looking for something that's inside, there's a famous theater right in the heart of downtown Menomonie. The world-famous Mabel Tainter Theater puts on a few shows a month, ranging from concerts to romantic plays to comedy shows. For
