WELCOME TO WOTS



TO DRIFT IS TO DIE

I was once in your boat. I was following the current that society charted out for me. College was simply a coordinate that guided me to the next one to accomplish my version of "The American Dream." In hindsight, it did lead me onward. Yet, at some point, the next coordinate on the map was different than I had planned. Instead of following the

current society offered me – career, marriage, family, and retirement – I found a different way. I set my sails against the current, but I didn't do it alone. I did it with others who also realized that to drift is to die a slow, painful, meaningless death.

Street Level Ministries (SLM) is a Christian campus organization that provides students with an alternative to society's current. It is made up of a group of students and recent graduates who take the Bible seriously, seeking to know who Jesus is and center our lives around Him. We believe Him when He says, "The thief comes only to steal, kill, and destroy. I came that they may have life and have it abundantly." Do you want an abundant life? BIBLE

Romans 10:17 says, "Faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God" (NKJV). In SLM, we want to live radical lives of faith that are based on hearing, reading, and obeying God's Word as revealed in the Bible. Each branch of SLM meets every week to take an honest look at what the Bible says and discuss how it applies to our lives. You don't need to have any background in Christianity to join us. Just come

COMMUNITY

College can be such a lonely place. Even though people surround you, you're out of your comfort zone and navigating unfamiliar territory. It's a strange time in your life, and the company you keep will either make or break you.2 In SLM, you will find a diverse community of once-strangers who were brought together for a straightforward purpose: Although we come from various upbringings and have many different interests, we find unity in our love for Jesus. We don't always agree, but we




can look past our differences and embrace them because our friendships run deeper than whether pineapple should be on pizza (which it should).

SERVICE

Life isn't about you. Has no one told you that before? Well, I just did. Glad we got that out of the way. Jesus set an example for us. He said, "Whoever would be great among you must be your servant, and whoever would be first among you must be your slave."3 Don't you get it? True life is found when you take your eyes off yourself and put them on others. Even psychologists agree that doing good to others can decrease symptoms of depression and improve emotional well-being. 4 By volunteering for one of the branches of SLM, you can use your passions, talents, and abilities to serve God and others. Even if you're not "qualified" (that was one excuse I gave), it doesn't matter. Jesus will use you if you're available and willing to learn (and fail...a lot). This was one of the most radical things I experienced as a student in SLM. I knew what Jesus saved me from, but I had no idea what He saved me for until I started serving.

CALLING

Did you know you were created for one singular grand purpose in life?⁵ Your life is not an accident. Why not discover what you were created for, right now, before all the trappings of society weigh you down? Many people think calling is an individual thing, but it has a lot to do with other people. When you become a Christian, you get adopted into the family of God,⁶ you are given gifts to serve others, ⁷ and you have a role to play in the body of Christ.⁸ In SLM, we encourage students to connect to a local church where they can live out the purpose that God



has created them for. Jesus gave His life up for the Church. He didn't die for a campus ministry. So, don't wait until after college to join a church. If you claim you love Jesus, then you can't avoid loving His body – the Church. 10

ONE GIRL'S TRUE STORY

FROM DWELLING IN SECRECY TO BEING REVEALED

ide-and-seek was one of my favorite games as a kid, but I still hid from people as I grew up. I dodged behind good things like being a decent daughter, going to church, and generally doing the "right" thing. However, I didn't want to follow God as much as I wanted to control my own life. I wanted to do whatever sounded good to me. In my heart, I wanted to travel, have a career, make money, be entertained, and have good relationships, but no one found me out. At least that's what I thought. I put on the attitude of a

"good" person so that others would see me that way. I felt guilty because I knew deep down that I wasn't a good person. I prayed, read the Bible, and memorized verses, but I still felt separated from God. Eventually, I gave up looking for God. I just started to do what I wanted by convincing myself that God could use entertainment, job, family, and friends if He wanted to. I even felt better than other people because my life looked cleaner and more put together than theirs.

Throughout high school and into the first year of college, my sin ate at me from the inside. I secretly struggled with pornography, perfectionism, lying, and binge eating, among other things. I tried to lie and cover it all up by deleting my browser history and saying the right things. I was terrified of someone discovering that I was sinful. Instead of trying to get help, I covered it up and isolated myself. I looked like the perfect Christian on the outside, but on the inside, I was rotting.

One day while driving to work, I realized that I had to choose: live for God or for me. I realized that God loves me so much that He wanted a relationship with me, even though He saw my secret life and was

grieved to watch me try to live life apart from Him. Jesus died and rose again so that I could stand before God blameless under the sacrifice of His Son Jesus. I wanted to allow God to control my life, but I realized I never could on my own. I didn't know what to do, but I prayed and asked God to show me. I started by confessing to a friend and joining a Bible study to get help and accountability. I started reading the Bible and learning more about who God is and what He is asking me to do.

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Over the next year, I transferred to UW-Stout from home and moved to Menomonie, Wisconsin. Moving away felt like a new beginning. I started going to church regularly and found Street Level Ministries. I thought I was a good Christian before, but I began to see what I was lacking through interacting with other Christians and reading the Bible. My life felt messier and more complicated than before because I started to realize how much sin was in my life. The closer I got to God, the more I realized my need for Him. I began to understand that I needed God to save me, and after that, I needed Him to continue saving me.

I still struggle to keep God at the center of my life and against sin and temptation, but now He helps and guides me. God asks me to give up my pride, porn, laziness, selfishness, and self-pity. God asked me to start reading His Word daily, serving with a local church, and sharing my relationship with

God and testimony with others. I stopped trying to control the way my life would go and let God shape it. God is transforming my mind and forming me into the woman He created me to be (Romans 12:2). I am a new creation (2 Corinthians 5:17).





t times Christianity can be confusing. When you start to read the Bible, there can be names of people and places you have never heard before, words that have little to no meaning outside of the world of faith, and recognizable things that have a more profound purpose than you'd ever imagine. Let's jump into understanding where the Bible came from and its purpose.

WHAT IS IT?

The Greek word "ta Biblia" means "the books" and is where the term Bible originates. The Bible contains various forms of literature: narrative, poems, songs, history, laws, wisdom, prophecy, and letters. The first part, The Old Testament (OT), was written before Jesus' time on Earth and was the original Hebrew Bible. It outlines the character, holiness, and laws of God. It also tells the history of His chosen people, the nation of Israel. The New Testament (NT) was added to the Bible later after Jesus ascended to heaven. It recounts Jesus' life in the four Gospels, the start of the early church in the book of Acts, the direction for living as Jesus' followers in the Epistles, and the consummation of all things in Revelation.

Together, both testaments tell the story of creation, the fall of humanity, the redemption for sinners, and the restoration of the world as God intended.

MORE THAN JUST A BOOK

The Bible not only gives us the story behind God's plan for humanity, it also reveals the power of God, which lies in its divinity. Some critics question legitimacy because men wrote it. But the prophets in the OT and Jesus' disciples in the NT who wrote the Bible were divinely inspired. They received authority to proclaim the Word of God through the power of the Holy Spirit. The evidence of this power is clear today because anyone that reads the Bible with a heart eager to know its Author is changed.

There are stories in the Bible that don't always make sense, but it doesn't mean it's impossible to discover the truth it contains. God's Holy Spirit will help you understand if you ask. As you read, you will learn how various parts of the Bible weave together, which will help you make sense of it as a whole. Then you will discover that the Bible is a love letter containing God's message to humanity, not a dusty list of archaic rules.

WHAT IS THE BIBLE?

Christians believe that the written words of God are holy, living, and active (Hebrews 4:12), so reading and obeying the Bible is an essential part of practicing the Christian faith. It instructs us to persevere in goodness and charity, share the Gospel, and proclaim the love of God to humankind.

THE TRANSFORMATIVE POWER

The Bible was written by approximately 40 men, in many different places, over 15 centuries, and its last chapter was written thousands of years ago. And yet, the truths that it reveals are as relevant today as they were then. That is because

we have something in common with these men and women: we all experience sin and death. It's not very hard to see that. We feel it every day and observe it in the world around us. That's what makes the existence of the Bible all the more amazing. How is it that it came to be except through the sheer power of God? If it was solely up to humans, there's no way we would have collectively come up with this impossibly cohesive book. That fact alone makes it supremely trustworthy. It was not written and compiled for us to win debates or memorize verses to boost our self-esteem. It was given to us so we could receive, experience, and fall in love with the One whom the whole Bible revolves around: Jesus Christ.

Why Read the Bible? AND HOW TO STUDY SCRIPTURE FOR YOURSELF

love broccoli. My 8-year-old self, who found the little trees disgusting, would be surprised to see it frequently on my current meal plans. Whether in a stir fry or served raw, broccoli has become a favorite of mine. The problem is, those green dot things do get stuck in my teeth. Unless there's a friend discreetly scratching their tooth while making eye contact with me, only the next glance in a mirror will reveal the current situation: something is wrong and needs fixing.

The Bible, in the same way, acts as a mirror. It is one overarching story of the depravity of humanity and God's plan to make right what went so very wrong after sin entered the scene. It explains the reason for evil in the world, how God created us, and why Jesus needed to come to save all humanity. It tells us what is wrong and needs fixing, both in the world and in our lives individually. When the law was given to Israel for the first time (see Exodus 19-24), it gave God's people commands for how to live, and it wasn't long before they rebelled. They turned away from God to follow other gods and pursue whatever they felt was best. Rebellion has been the pattern of humanity ever since, and unless we look into the perfect mirror and ask God to transform our hearts and minds, repeating the cycle is our default, too.

PRAY FOR CHANGE

If you desire to know God more and be like Jesus, reading Scripture is where to start. We read the Bible to learn who God is and what He's like by seeing how He interacted with those throughout history. Scripture tells us what's important to God, and as a result, where we're off base. Without the Word of God as our authority and standard, we wouldn't know when we're not living as God designed us to live. Likewise, reading about the life and ministry of Jesus while He was on earth is the only way we can start to be like Him. As you read, pray you'd be ready to change some things. Pray that when your life and Scripture don't line up, you'd be willing to submit to its authority. In Psalm 51:10, David prays, "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right

spirit within me" (ESV). May this always be our heart towards God and His Word.

A PATIENT COMMITMENT


Modern Christians have cheated themselves by substituting daily Bible reading for short devotionals. Commit to reading a portion of the Bible each day, and you will see its unified story come through. 2 Timothy 3:16 says that Scripture is "God-breathed," meaning it is God's words to us. Devotionals can be a helpful tool, but God Himself has inspired only the Bible. Yes, you will get to portions of the Bible that don't make sense right away. Yes, you will want to sleep in some days instead of reading about ancient kings. But in the long run? You'll see how God uses His Word to change the way you think, experience His comfort at just the right time, and grow in your knowledge of the Bible. Psalm 1:1-3 says, "Oh, the joys of those who do not follow the advice of the wicked...but they delight in the law of the Lord, meditating on it day and night. They are like trees planted along the riverbank, bearing fruit each season. Their leaves never wither, and they prosper in all they do" (NLT). Discipline yourself and press on in your studies.

REAL-LIFE APPLICATION

The Bible refers to the absurdity of not picking the hypothetical broccoli out of your teeth once you know it's there. James 1:23-25 says, "For if you listen to the word and don't obey, it is like glancing at your face in a mirror. You see yourself, walk away, and forget what you look like. But if you look carefully into the perfect law that sets you free, and if you do what it says and don't forget what you heard, then God will bless you for doing it" (NLT). The writings found in Scripture aren't just good ideas or optional suggestions. They actually list what God sees as necessary. Not only that, but God has a job for His people to do. Ephesians 2:10 says, "For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them" (ESV). When we read accounts in the Bible of people living radically for God (or worse, those who didn't), taking action ourselves should be the natural result.

HEAD

The head is superior to the rest of the body. It is the control center, and if disconnected from the body, renders it useless immediately. Jesus is to be your head as the highest place in your life and have complete control of it. When He is in the proper place, your body will work efficiently, effectively, and you will experience abundant life. Without Jesus in this role, the rest of your body is useless. Who is in control of your life? (Eph. 1:22-23, Prov. 3:5-6)

MIND

The mind is responsible for thoughts, emotions, reasoning abilities, and personality. The Bible tells us we are born with a mind that is greatly affected by sin, hostile toward God, and leads us to death. Jesus came to this world and died so that you could have the opportunity to get a brain transplant from Him. If you accept His offer, you can start to think and live as He does, which will bring mental stability, joy, and life. Do your thoughts bring you closer to or further from God? (Rom. 12:1-2, Col. 3:2, Rom. 8:6-11)

EARS

The outer ear collects sound waves from the environment, and the inner ear is responsible for organizing and transmitting that data to the brain. Even if the ear looks good on the outside, it doesn't guarantee auditory function. Jesus frequently spoke the phrase, "He who has ears, let Him hear," during His ministry because He surrounded Himself with people who, on the outside, looked like they were able to hear from God. Their daily actions looked moral and religious, but they would not or could not hear Him when God was standing directly in front of them. Sure, they could listen to Him audibly, but what they heard did not affect their lives, so they might as well not have heard anything He said. Can you hear Him? (Mark 4:13-20, Gal. 3:2)

EYES

90% of data processed in the brain is visual. The eyes are responsible for seeing this information clearly, but they can only work if there is light. The Bible speaks of people living in either darkness (separated from God) or light (having a close relationship with God). Sometimes it is more comfortable to stay in the dark rather than turning on the blinding light of truth in our lives. Do you see the world around you clearly, or are you stumbling through the dark, fearful of someone flipping on the exposing light? (John 8:12, Eph. 5:8-14)

TONGUE

This three-inch-long muscular structure in your mouth is essential for communicating clearly. For the Christian, the tongue wields a lot of power for either good or evil. Christians are to speak the truth, share the gospel, encourage one another, and worship God. Lies, slander, cursing, and gossip should not come out of the mouth of a Christian. Simply avoiding a list of certain words or topics isn't what's at stake here. What you say reveals the deeper issues of what is in your heart. The words you say indicate what you believe. What kinds of words come out of your mouth when you speak? (Eph. 4:29, James 3:5-12, Luke 6:45)

HEART

The average human heart pumps 100,000 times a day to deliver life-giving blood to the rest of the body. The Bible explains that everyone is born with a desperately wicked and deceitful heart. If left in this condition, it will prove to be eternally fatal. Similar to the mind, Jesus offers a heart transplant. We can love like He loves and have compassion on those He has compassion. Even after this transplant, though, these new hearts can still be prone to disease if we're not careful. How's your heart doing? Is it beating in time with Christ's, or is it slowly succumbing to bitterness, pride, or rebellion? (Ezek. 36:26, Jeremiah 17:9)

STOMACH

The stomach is full of acid and enzymes that help turn what we eat into the energy and nutrients the body needs to survive. It is also the only organ that God says people turn into an idol by giving in to whatever desire or appetite they please. A Christian's diet should consist of nutrient-rich truth. But often, we tend to fill up on spiritual junk food by chasing after whatever we crave in the world. Doing so leaves no room for truth or godliness in our life. What does your diet look like today? (Phil. 3:19, Gal. 5:16-24)

LUNGS

The lungs function automatically to keep vital air exchange going through our body. For the body to move, the lungs need to be working. The Christian life is a race full of twists, turns, and obstacles that will last the rest of your life. It is not a sprint or a short jog around the block. We need endurance. Jesus is the perfect example of how to finish this race well, so we should look to Him to understand how we can too. Do your lungs allow you to keep going through difficulty, or do you take a seat on the sidelines, gasping for air, with every hint of trouble that comes your way? (Heb. 12:1-3, 1 Corinth. 9:24-27)

HANDS

The human hand's brilliant design makes 58 distinct motions possible, rendering them one of the most complex tools we use daily. Having an opposable thumb makes us able to do much more than we could if we only had paws or hooves. With our hands, we can accomplish a lot of work. The work we do can either serve God and others or ourselves. God intended that we use our hands for the good of others by making our hands available for the tasks He wants us to do in the world. Who determines what your hands do? (1 Peter 4:9-10, Matt. 25: 35-40)

FEET

In addition to supporting the weight of our entire body, our feet are responsible for getting us everywhere we need to go. Jesus walked a lot while He was ministering to people. If you say you follow Jesus, you should constantly be on the move, allowing Him to lead you wherever He

wants, whether that be across the street to help a neighbor or across the world. Are your feet taking you anywhere? (Matt. 28:19-20, Micah 6:8, 1 Peter 2:21)

SPINE


The spinal column is comprised of 33 vertebrae, which provide structure, flexibility, and strength to the body. For Christians to remain flexible and mobile, they must continue to obey God. The more a person says no to what God is asking of them, the more inflexible their spine becomes. Fear can also strike a blow to the spinal column, leaving a Christian paralyzed, unable to move forward in their life with God. Do you let God change you how He wants, or do you stiffen at the thought of doing what He asks? (John 14:15, Rom. 1:18-24, 2 Tim. 1:7)

BLOOD

Usually, we cannot see if people have blood in their bodies, but you can tell if a person is alive or not. Likewise, it is hard to know if a person is a Christian just by looking at their physical appearance, but it should be evident if they are by the life they live. Your physical blood flows to each part of your body, giving it life. If you are a Christian, each aspect of your life should have the mark of the blood of Jesus: your thoughts become like His thoughts, your feet become His feet, and your desires are His desires. Have you had this blood transfusion? (Rom. 5:6-11, Rom. 3:23-27, Isaiah 53:5)

When you go to a doctor, it does no good to pretend you're not sick. The problem won't just go away if you pretend it's not there. If you've read through these aspects of the Christian life and find yourself less than healthy, turn to God and ask Him for help. Like physical ailments, your chances for spiritual recovery will increase the earlier you begin treatment, so don't procrastinate on these matters. Remember, your body is temporary and will die one day, but your spiritual health has significance for eternity.

A NIGHT AT THE SYMPHONY

PLAYING YOUR PART IN GOD'S GREAT HALL

magine you enter a behemoth of a room with balconies, hundreds of rows of chairs, ornate decorative stylings, and a brightly lit stage at the very front of it all. Large, oddly shaped carpets adorn the walls of this venue. You find your dimly lit seat in the middle of a narrow aisle surrounded by thousands of others eagerly waiting to enjoy a night of thunderous sounds, sweeping melodies, and enchanting music—a night at the symphony. You've found your seat early, and you notice that the musicians are already on stage warming up. Listening to these master craftsmen tune, strum, beat, and pluck, it's clear they've spent hours preparing for tonight's performance, but it sounds frankly disastrous at the moment. The resounding booms from the tubas overpower the screeches from the violins. The thunder from the timpani clashes out of sync with the cellists' melodious bellows. The trumpet section is so shrill it's obnoxious.

But then the conductor shows up. They confidently stride to the conductor's podium at the front of the orchestra as the audience surrounds them in applause. When they raise a single hand, the great hall falls instantly silent. Like a soldier awaiting orders, the musicians

focus intensely on the baton in the conductor's hand, ready to follow along and play whatever they've planned and rehearsed.



God is a lot like a conductor. He's in charge and has a plan and a desire for how things will go to keep everyone moving forward at the appropriate time. As the night of music unfolds before you, vou can't help but wonder, what if the whole orchestra decided not to listen to the conductor in charge? Without the cooperation of every musician, the music the conductor planned suffers. God, too, cannot stand rogue players. Proverbs 17:11 tells us, "An evil man seeks only rebellion" (ESV). However, when God's people follow His plan like musicians playing their instruments according to His instructions, a beautiful song results.

DISSONANCE

When people play out of tune, it's not pretty. The abrasive sound is jarring and can cause physical discomfort. J.R.R Tolkien knew this when he created the world of Middle Earth in his series, *The Lord of The Rings*. Tolkien's fictional representation of God in this saga sings all of creation into existence. He lets some of his angelic creations join in song



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to help take part in further creation, but one rebellious creation didn't want to sing in unison with the rest and rebelled in disobedience. This act of selfish, uncooperative, disjointed rebellion ends up introducing all the evil, sin, and chaos into creation. In the first book of the Bible, the third chapter of Genesis tells of Adam and Eve's rebellion and their disobedience to God. They chose their way over what God had for them, and it resulted in the fall of all humanity and introduced sin. evil, and pain into our lives. All the creation became fractured by sin. We still suffer the consequences of this to this day.

HARMONY

It's essential to play your part correctly. Musicians need to spend time practicing on their own to know their part in the symphony. More importantly, when gathered together, they need to follow along with the one in charge to play together properly. God is in control, not just on Sunday or at a Bible study. He's in charge always. I wait for the Lord, my soul waits..." Psalm 130:1-5 (ESV)

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


